1. **A calendar is a** human invented system of organizing units of time so that we can all be on the same schedule, even over long periods.
2. **A day** is the average time, ~24 hours, for the Earth to complete one rotation on its axis, from one midnight to the next.
3. **A month** . . . Dividing the year into smaller parts for convenience, it's the measure of time for the moon to complete one cycle. Each month is approximately the same number of days.
4. **A year** is the time it takes the earth to make one revolution around the sun, ~ 365 days.
5. **A lunar calendar** is a much older timekeeping system based on the monthly cycles of the moon--each month starts with the new moon. Shorter than a solar year, ~354 days, still used by some cultures.
6. **The month name January** recognizes the 2-faced Roman god Janus who was known as the protector of gates and doorways. This symbolizes beginnings, transitions and endings.
